Introduction

- Georgia II Compact (2014-2019),
- Administered by Millennium Challenge Account-Georgia (MCA-G).
- Focuses on
 - (i) improvement of general education learning environment,
 - (ii) industry-led skills and workforce development, and
 - (iii) strengthening higher education quality.
- \$34.35 million investment, Compact has facilitated the creation of San Diego State University-Georgia (SDSU-G) dual degree bachelor's programs,
- delivered in partnership with three (3) Georgian universities (Tbilisi State University, Ilia State University, and Georgian Technical University)
- Increase the number of students earning high-quality STEM degrees



The Challenge

- Interest to pilot a student financing facility
- Facilitate access to internationally-accredited STEM programs
- Include qualified Georgian students, regardless of their families' income.
- Financing facility fills a critical market gap, provide access to loans under more suitable conditions than currently exist in Georgia.
- Assuming sufficient risk cover and access to low-cost, long-term funds is possible:
 - MCA-G is confident that a student financing facility can be viable.
 - MCA-G is seeking to identify organizations competent to run a student financing facility



MCA-G has four (4) objectives for this initiative:

- 1. Pilot a model that can be scaled & student loans have a path to inclusion
- 2. (a) Support Georgian students pursuing internationally accredited STEM bachelor's degrees through July 1, 2019, with
- 2. (b) potential to expand to non-STEM internationally accredited and or joint/dual degree bachelor's and master's degree students after July 1, 2019
- 3. Ensure current and future students of SDSU-G and SDSU's partner universities have sufficient access to finance
- 4. Support students in certain MCA-G-supported upper level TVET programs established with MCC funding (please see list at: www.iswd.ge)



MCA-G Program Parameters and Priorities

- MCA-G proposes interested parties incorporate a limited set of terms and conditions most important to MCA-G
- Otherwise, submitting parties are entrusted with designing the facility
- Key parameters from MCA-G's perspective to be considered:
 - Georgian students of internationally accredited STEM degree programs
 - MCA-G-supported upper level TVET programs through July 1, 2019
 - Potential to expand majors and degrees after July 1, 2019
 - Effective interest rate not to exceed ~12%
 - No significant hidden costs or additional fees to the borrower
 - An adequate grace period and repayment period (e.g. of ~6-8 years)



MCA-G's Contribution to the Student Financing Facility

- Initial \$250,000 can be provided to catalyze a pilot program (tranche one)
- Disbursement will be contingent upon meeting certain milestones
- MCC and MCA-G are interested in expanding the pilot's scope if successful
- Provided funds (both the initial tranche and the potential second tranche) are envisioned for:
 - I. a first loss credit guarantee,
 - II. technical assistance for the administrator and subordinate, lender(s)
 - III. technical assistance for students
 - IV. investment(s) in lending infrastructure, subject to MCA-G agreement
- MCA-G would prefer the guarantee initially focus on STEM-oriented loans
- Respondents should also feel free to include recommendations on beyond STEM focused lending



To Include:

- 1. Access to long-term, inexpensive, Lari-denominated funds to a financial institution for on-lending to students, and
- 2. A reputable financial institution with a social impact investment and human capacity development mandate, such as a bank or micro-finance institution (MFI), to originate and administer student loans,
- 3. A guarantor to mitigate the risk that is inherent in student lending
- 4. In addition to these core elements, technical assistance might be required to set up and administer a guarantee program (e.g. work with financial institution(s) to carry out risk analysis or student applicants)



Criteria

- Seeking innovative approaches to address access to, and cost of, student loan programs in Georgia
- Should integrate local level capacities and resources in the operation
- Pursue support from DFIs/IFIs to help underwrite risks/defray loan loss
- Address the inherently unique risks/challenges to implementation of the proposed approach
- Present new ideas to increase capacity, improve operating effectiveness, and ensure reliability and sustainability
- Driven by local partner organizations
- Leverage best practices and incorporate private sector-driven principles
- Expect the submitted concepts to include ways to generate long-term profitability / sustainability / growth



Potential Procurement

- MCC plans to utilize these submissions to listen to the market
- Review concepts and facility design submitted by the respondents in accordance with this Call for Ideas
- Incorporate into our design approach
- Build a draft procurement for MCA-G Board approval
- MCA-G envisions the launch of a formal selection process to implement this pilot program and subsequently launch the financing facility before the end of calendar year 2018



Timeline

- 5 October, 2018 Market Presentation and Outreach
- 12 October, 2018 Deadline for additional questions
- 16 October, 2018 MCA-G publishes responses to questions received
- 22 October, 2018 Call for Ideas window Closes
- 2 November 2018 Review of Ideas Complete
- Early December MCA Board Review and Approval Request
- Late December Procurement Launch (pending approval)
- Early 2019 Procurement Award
